## Pest Alert: Potato spindle tuber viroid (PSTVd)

- Potato spindle tuber viroid (PSTVd) is a serious pathogen of potato and tomato. Infection reduces yield and market quality.
- The viroid is present around the world. Many countries have eradicated outbreaks, including the UK. However, the pathogen can be symptomless in many host plants and escape detection.
- The main hosts are potato, tomato, pepper and related ornamental plants. Infected potato plants are often **stunted** and produce **small** and **misshaped tubers**, but symptoms can vary depending on potato variety and growing conditions. Stunted tomato plants may **yellow** and **stop producing fruit**. Ornamental plants generally do not show signs of disease.
- The viroid moves long distances by **infected plants**, **tubers**, and **seed**. Spread within a crop or region can occur by **contact**, such as with contaminated tools or machinery. PSTVd is also spread by **pollen** or certain **insects**.
